1. CONTEXT AND OBJECTIVES

The MGI School of Fine Arts (SFA) is one of the rare art schools in the Indian Ocean region: with four large, well-equipped studios, and computer labs, as well as a dedicated gallery space. The SFA has been running high demand courses in Fine Arts for more than three decades.

The objectives of this programme are to, firstly, enable the students to develop a sound mastery of image production using traditional mediums (drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking), as well as in conjunction with new media (digital photography, video, etc). Secondly, critical thinking and independent learning abilities, are developed in conjunction with proper (visual) communication skills, teamwork, management and leadership skills essential in the creative industry sectors. This is complemented with the acquisition of a deep and wide cultural understanding and aesthetic appreciation of art throughout history. Finally, the students are expected to comprehend the responsibilities of artists particularly in terms of ethics and as contributors to sustainable development objectives.

Competencies and Career Opportunities

The overall aim of the programme is to train the contemporary generation of visual artists by imparting the skill and competencies relevant to the pursuance of a career in the visual arts locally and internationally. The new programme is scheduled over a period of three years. After the first year, the student is expected to acquire basic skills in the various art mediums and an overall perspective of the history of art. At the end of the second year, the student will have acquired intermediate knowledge and skills in the visual arts including an internship that enable them to align their studies with career goal, personal aspirations and actual labour demand. After completion of the third year, students will have obtained a comprehensive skillset based on their areas of specialisation: Painting, Printmaking, Sculpture or Visual Culture Theory. However, the running of a specialisation will be subject to availability of resources and critical mass of students which is normally 7. The maximum of students per specialisation varies from 8 to 12)

Career opportunities exist in the creative industries in the form of independent visual artist: painter, sculptor, printmaker, illustrator and cartoonist; interdisciplinary artist, art-entrepreneur, crafts-person, curator, art critic, etc; and in the educational sector as art educator; in the management sector as art organiser and art administrator.

2. LEARNING OUTCOMES

At the end of the 3 years' programme the graduates should be able to:

- Apply the technical and conceptual abilities to work as an independent visual artist;
- Apply behaviours such as curiosity initiative and persistence that will help him/her engage with the
 world in productive ways;
- Apply skills and techniques to generate novel ideas of value to solve problems;
- Create independent or collaborative works to achieve stated objectives;
- Develop new ideas and design context for artistic production.

3. TEACHING AND LEARNING METHODS

Modules will be taught in a blended mode, partly online and face-to-face in a studio set up. A substantial amount of the practical classes will be carried out face-to-face in the art studios (drawing, painting, sculpture, printmaking) as well as in the computer labs. Therefore, the emphasis is self-learning in an art studio context, as a prelude to a career as studio artist. New technologies will enable students to produce different and varied types of artworks and will become another medium in their repertoire of tools that responds to the changes in the art practiced today.

Practice-based Research Portfolio BVA 3000Y(3)

This module is an independent practice-based research project undertaken by the student under the supervision of the Supervisor. The student is expected to produce 3 final artworks which are original and developed over the entire year. These artworks should be presented through a Vivavoce, a curated formal exhibition, a written text of 2500 words, together with a Portfolio showing the step-by-step development of the practical work. All above mentioned submissions should be uploaded on the Google classroom created by the Programme Coordinator.

7.4 Internships

This module consists of a 6 to 8 weeks practice-based opportunity to gain hands-on, real-world experience that will foster professional skills alongside creative practice, and can be undertaken flexibly at any time from the end of the second year.

10. Modules Outline

Year 1 (common to all specialisations)

BVA 1012Y(1) Painting I

Fundamentals of Painting: Introduction to different mediums and painting techniques such as water colour, oil and acrylic. Application of colour theory and its use in creating harmony, contrast and ambience to emphasize visual content. Introduction to figurative painting with an understanding of the different movements in modern art. Basic drawing techniques complement the introduction to painting mediums.

BVA 1013Y(1) Printmaking I: Planography and Relief Printing

Introduction to the basic nature of Printmaking, the elementary printing processes (Monotype / Stencilling/Collagraphs/ Card board Prints) and the Printmaking conventions (Registration/ Authentication / Edition). Development of intrinsic characteristics of the discipline, like drawing and design skills and the aesthetic of image making. Exploration of relief printing techniques with varying matrixes (wood/Lino/ Plaster/ Scraps), encompassing different methods; block printing, reduction method, colour multiple plates, varying matrix materials and embossing.

Assessment: 50% Continuous assessment

50% Practical examination

BVA 1014Y(1) Sculpture I Basic Technics of Sculpture – Mould and Casting

This module introduces the various materials used to create sculptures such as clay, plaster, and wire. Students will learn how to manipulate these materials and use sculpting tools and welding techniques safely. Emphasis will be laid on volume, colour, form, and texture, and other elements of sculpture. The students will learn how to make three-dimensional sculpture using techniques such as carving, mould and casting of relief, 2- and 3-piece mould. They will analyse other works of sculpture through reading, presentation, discussion and critique. 3D drawings form an integral part of the module.

BVA 1015Y(1) Digital Media I

Introduction to graphic design tools and principles, digital sketching and painting. Digital photography and photo-manipulation. Colour separation for print.

Introduction to art history with an overview from prehistory to the contemporary art practiced today. Key art historical moments in various cultures from Africa, Asia and Europe. Introduction to various media in modern society and basic media theory.

BVA 2011Y(3) Drawing I

Introduction to different approaches to drawing, focusing on a wide variety of techniques and materials. Developing personal technical skills and enlarging the visual vocabulary of the student. This module includes perspective, human figure, architectural and landscape drawings.

BVA 2012Y(3) Painting II: Creative Painting and Portraiture

Portrait studies in painting, critical studies around the works of the old masters. Creative painting both in visual and conceptual expression with reference to the status of painting as a medium in contemporary art. Building a strong set of representational skills, counterbalanced with an ability to develop expressiveness.

BVA 2013Y(3) Printmaking II: Serigraphy, Digital media and Intaglio Printing

Screen-printing processes (stencilling, block out technique and photo emulsion method) will be used to develop hand-drawn or digitally generated images that pertain to the practice. Exploration of intaglio printing techniques like dry point, line engraving, etching and aquatint. Development of practical skills and acquisition of theoretical awareness will allow visual exploration and lead towards more informed prints.

BVA 2014 Y(3) Sculpture II

This module will delve into the various techniques and media employed in the creations of intricate freestanding sculptures using wire, scrap, metal sheets, plaster and clay. It offers students a unique opportunity to hone their observational skills through ample hands-on practice and foster their artistic thinking. Use of tools to create different joints, weld structures and experience in creating formation of different densities from delicate to solid.

BVA 2017Y(3) Visual Culture Theory II

Art theory module: modernism, and art theory of the 20th century (common to all specialisations)

Art history and art theory issues of the 20th century will be introduced in this module. The historical developments in art history will serve as the starting point to further explore more recent theoretical discussions such as semiotics and various types of responses to images. The shift from art history to visual culture theory will be analysed.

BVA 2119 S(3) Photography and Video Art 1¹

An introduction to photographic and video techniques with focus on the development of knowledge and skills needed for the production of creative digital images. The emphasis will be on still photography including history of photography, picture taking techniques, photo-imaging and manipulation using specific software. Students will be challenged to use both technical and artistic skills to communicated creative ideas through the photo artwork based on hand on exploration and skill development activities. A short introduction to video art will be made.

BVA 3001S(5) Internship

The student must demonstrate an awareness of contemporary art practiced today and reference both local and international artists in his/ her work.

BVA 3017Y(5) Visual Culture Theory III

The focus of this module will be on contemporary art issues and its theoretical underpinnings. Relevant contemporary art theories and art philosophies (namely post-semiotics and affect theory, to name some more recent developments) will be discussed in relation to the local and international art contexts.

Assessment: 40 % Continuous assessment

BVA 3219S(3) Photography and Video II²

Study of photography and video art, with an emphasis on the experimental aspect of the moving image. Exploring multicolour printing, through the exploration of the three main attributes of viscosity method. Based on theoretical research, individual printing experiences and the historic practice of printmaking, the student will further explore a range of techniques, materials and processes to develop a personal style in the discipline and produce technically and conceptually informed and resolved prints. The student must demonstrate an awareness of contemporary art and reference both local and international artists in his/ her work.

BVA 3017Y(5) Visual Culture Theory III

The focus of this module will be on contemporary art issues and its theoretical underpinnings. BVA 3118S(5) Art Education¹

This module will further consolidate the concepts and practices related to the teaching of art at secondary level. Art appreciation and writing about art. Teaching practice under the supervision of the lecturer may be carried out for a pre-defined number of hours in Secondary Schools.

Assessment: 40 % Continuous assessment

60 % Theory examination

BVA 3000Y(5) Dissertation/ Project

This is a supervised capstone project where the student demonstrates the skills, conceptual abilities and acquired competencies in a body of work that will serve as his/her major portfolio elements. The practical project consisting of 5 works should be supported by an essay of 2000-2500 words and a research portfolio. The project can include references to post-colonial theories, or ecological and sustainable development concerns, and societal issues.

Mid-year portfolio 25%

(Including at least two practical works, research and written documentation)

Viva-voce 10% Exhibition and Dissertation (2000 to 2500 words) 65%

Specialisation in Visual Culture Theory - Year III

BVA 3001S(5) Internship

This module consists of a 6 to 8 weeks practice-based opportunity to gain hands-on, real-world experience that will foster professional skills alongside creative practice, and can be undertaken flexibly at any time from the end of the first year.

The Internship module will be based on the following under the guidance of the internship coordinator:

- (i) Apprenticeships
- (ii) community arts projects
- (iii) creative workshops.

Assessment: The student will be evaluated as follows:

- (i) On the feedback submitted by the Employer through the Evaluation Form – (30%)
- Documentation with photographs, videos and a report (1000 -1500 words) on his/her (ii) experience, challenges and opportunities of the cultural industry – (40%)
- Viva Voce (30 %) (iii)

BVA 3011Y(5) Drawing II:

This module will enable students to rethink drawing in the contemporary and local contexts and its conceptual implications in art. Students will be encouraged to develop contemporary drawing to give art a public dimension. The students must demonstrate a developed ability in drawing media with fluency, maturity and flexibility.

BVA 3016Y(5) Art Theory

Further exposure and investigation of core art theory concepts. Academic and art appreciation writing techniques. This module will focus on theoretical issues in visual culture theory, and look at the intersection of aesthetics, philosophy, recent art history,

BVA 3017Y(5) Visual Culture Theory III

The focus of this module will be on contemporary art issues and its theoretical underpinnings. Relevant contemporary art theories and art philosophies (namely post-semiotics and affect theory, to name some more recent developments) will be discussed in relation to the local and international art contexts.
